A BILL

For the relief of William F. Friedman.

- 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
- 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,
- 3 That the Secretary of the Treasury is authorized and directed
- .4 to pay to William F. Friedman, out of any money in the
- 5 Treasury not otherwise appropriated, the sum of \$100,000,
- 6 in full settlement for all rights in respect of his inventions in
- 7 connection with military, naval, and air communications
- 8 facilities which are now or at any time have been placed in
- 9 secrecy status by the War Department or the Department of
- 10 Defense, including but not limited to all rights with respect
- 11 to his inventions covered by Patent Numbered 2,395,863 and

- 1 by patent application serials 682,096, 107,244, 70,412,
- 2 443,320, 478,193, and 549,086, and with respect to all
- 3 inventions for which patent applications have been withheld
- 4 by the War Department or Department of Defense in order
- 5 to preserve secrecy: Provided, That no part of the amount
- 6 appropriated in this Act in excess of 10 per centum thereof
- 7 shall be paid or delivered to or received by any agent or
- 8 attorney on account of services rendered in connection with
- 9 this claim, and the same shall be unlawful, any contract to
- 10 the contrary notwithstanding. Any person violating the pro-
- 11 visions of this Act shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor
- 12 and upon conviction thereof shall be fined in any sum not
- 13 exceeding \$1,000.

To establish a Joint Committee on Science adoug Ut
1 :: Resolved by the Senate and House of Representatives
2 of the United States of America in Congress assembled,
3 That there is hereby established a Joint: Committee ion
4 Science (refeired to hereinafter as the "committee"), to be
5 composed of seven members of the Senate to be appointed
.6: by the President of the Senate, seven members of the House
7 of Representatives to be appointed by the Speaker of the
8 House of Representatives, and such other members of the
9 Senate and the House of Representatives as shall signify their
intention of becoming members of the committee by filing a
declaration to that effect in writing with the chairman of

- 1 the committee. Not more than four of the appointed mem-
- 2 bers from each House shall be members of the same political
- 3 party.
- 4 SEC. 2. In order to promote a better understanding of
- 5 the actual and potential impact of science upon public af-
- 6 fairs, including human and natural resources, interstate and
- 7 foreign commerce, relations with foreign nations, the com-
- 8 mon defense and security, and the national health, prosperity,
- 9 and welfare, the committee shall endeavor to keep itself in-
- 10 formed with respect to, and bring to the notice of Members
- 11 of the Congress, the results of scientific research and techni-
- 12 cal development which bear upon public affairs, and the
- 13 problems being encountered in maintaining in the United
- -14 States a scientific and technical effort of outstanding quality
- .15 and accomplishment.
- :16 SEC. 3. The functions of the committee shall not super-
- 17 sede in any way the duties and responsibilities of any stand-
- ing or select committee of the Senate or House of Represent-
- 19 atives or any joint committee of the Senate and House of
- 20 Representatives.
- 21 Sec. 4. (a) The appointed committee members shall
- 22 elect a chairman and a vice chairman from among the
- 23 appointed committee members. The chairman of the com-
- 24 mittee shall be elected from among the Members of one
- 25 House serving thereon, and the vice chairman shall be

- 1 elected from among the Members of the other House serving
- 2 thereon. Until the expiration of the present Congress the
- 3 chairman shall be a Member of the Senate. Thereafter,
- 4 during each even-numbered Congress the chairman shall be
- 5 a Member of the House of Representatives and during each
- 6 odd-numbered Congress the chairman shall be a Member of
- 7 the Senate.
- 8 (b) Vacancies in the membership of the appointed
- 9 committee members shall not affect the power of the remain-
- 10 ing appointed and other members to execute the functions
- 11 of the joint committee and shall be filled in the same manner
- 12 as in the case of the original selection. A majority of the
- 13 appointed committee members shall constitute a quorum.
- (c) The appointed committee members shall constitute
- 15 themselves the steering group of the committee. In plan-
- 16 ning the committee program and in determining the places
- and times at which the committee shall meet, the chairman
- shall advise and consult with the steering group.
- 19 Sec. 5. (a) The committee, or any duly authorized
- 20 subcommittee thereof, is authorized to meet at such places
- 21 and times as it deems advisable. Not less frequently than
- 22 once a year the committee shall meet with the National
- 23 Science Board of the National Science Foundation.
- (b) To assist the committee in planning and carrying
- out its activities, the committee is authorized (1) to utilize

- the services, facilities, and personnel of the National Science · 1
 - 2 Foundation, and, with the consent of the head of any other
 - 3 department or agency in the executive branch of the Govern-
 - ment, the services, facilities, and personnel of such other
 - department or agency, and (2) to accept the voluntary
 - assistance of any private individual or organization.
