- l. Attention is invited to recent discussion between Major Ellis of Army Communications Service and Captain Eatch of the Security Division relative to Action 2 of Transmittal Sheet from Army Communications Service, 25 May 1945, subject as above, wherein it was determined that the Signal Security Agency response could satisfactorily be submitted a few days beyond the deadline set in the basic communication.
- 2. It is observed that when classified cryptographic equipments are obsolete, and are no longer to be retained, they are destroyed. It is also to be noted that cryptographic equipments have no commercial counterpart and therefore require considerable time for procurement. For these reasons it is recommended that the following equipments be considered appropriate for war reserve until such time as declared obsolete:
  - a. Converter M-134-C, D
  - b. Converter M-209, A, B
  - c. Converter M-228
  - 1. Converter M-294
  - e. Converter M-325
  - f. Converter M-409
  - g. Converter MX-218()/U
  - h. Converter Attackment AN/GSA-2

  - m. Speech Equipment AF/GSQ-2, 3
  - n. Facsimile Equipment AN/GXA-1, 2
  - Automatic Device for checking and printing N-209 pin and lug settings
  - p. Strip Cutter utilized in the production of strips for Strip Device M-138-A and/or CSP 845.
